

# Using X-Loader with the OMAP35x Linux BSP Application Note 460

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#### **Abstract**

This application note explains how to replace the standard LogicLoader bootloader with X-Loader on the Zoom™ OMAP35x Development Kit or Zoom OMAP35x Torpedo Development Kit.

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#### 1 Introduction

This document explains how to replace LogicLoader with X-Loader on the Zoom™ OMAP35x Development Kit or Zoom OMAP35x Torpedo Development Kit. Logic PD provides a custom version of X-Loader that will work with the Logic PD OMAP35x Linux BSP; this X-Loader is provided as part of the OMAP35x Linux BSP download.

#### 1.1 Nomenclature

- This document covers the OMAP35x SOM-LV and OMAP35x Torpedo SOM. Use of "OMAP35x SOM" suggests text that applies to both platforms; information specific to one platform will call out the precise name.
- Use of "Zoom OMAP35x Development Kit" suggests text that applies to both the OMAP35x SOM-LV Development Kit and OMAP35x Torpedo Development Kit; information specific to one development kit will call out the precise name.

### 2 Prerequisites

The following items are necessary to complete the procedures in this document.

- Zoom OMAP35x Development Kit registered on Logic PD's support site<sup>1</sup>
- Host PC
- Available serial port or USB-to-serial adapter
- Terminal emulation program
- Active Internet connection
- SD card
- SD card reader

Before continuing, it is also necessary to complete Section 2.1 and Section 2.2 below.

#### 2.1 Connect Kit to Host PC

- 1. Use the gray serial cable included in the OMAP35x Development Kit to connect the serial port on the kit to the appropriate port on your host PC.
- 2. Launch your terminal emulation program and set the following port settings:

a. Baud rate: 115200

b. Data: 8 bitc. Parity: Noned. Stop: 1 bit

e. Flow control: **None** 

#### 2.2 Download OMAP35x Linux BSP

To get the X-Loader version for your OMAP35x SOM, it is necessary to download the OMAP35x Linux BSP from Logic PD's website.

- 1. Log into Logic PD's <u>support site</u><sup>2</sup> using your username and password.
- 2. Navigate to the product page for your product and locate the *Linux* section heading.
- 3. Click on the OMAP35x SOM Linux Demo Image to download the BSP.
- 4. Save the ZIP file to your host PC and extract the file.

## 3 Upload X-Loader to OMAP35x SOM

This section will explain the steps to replace the LogicLoader bootloader on your OMAP35x SOM with the Logic PD custom version of X-Loader.

#### 3.1 Copy Boot Files to SD Card

- 1. Copy the following files from the Linux BSP download to a blank SD card.
  - x-load.bin.ift (X-Loader first stage bootloader binary image)
  - u-boot.bin (U-Boot bootloader binary image)
  - u-boot (ELF file)
  - ulmage (Linux kernel)
  - rootfs.yaffs2 (YAFFS root filesystem)

**NOTE:** These files may have a 10xxxxx number preceding the file name (e.g., 1016980\_x-load.bin.ift). Once copied to the SD card, feel free to remove the 10xxxxx\_ characters from the file names so that they will be easier to use in the instructions that follow.

2. Insert the SD card into the SD card slot on the OMAP35x Development Kit baseboard.

#### 3.2 Identify PoP Memory Chip ECC Method

Before beginning, it is important to know what Package-on-Package (PoP) memory chip is on the SOM; this is necessary because the error-correcting code (ECC) method is different depending upon the chip manufacturer and die revision. Knowing what PoP memory chip is on your SOM will tell you whether a 4-bit ECC or 1-bit ECC method is used.

The following steps provide the best method to identify the ECC method.

- 1. Launch a terminal emulation program.
- 2. Power on your development kit and wait until you see the LogicLoader losh> prompt.
- 3. Use the *load elf* command to load the *u-boot* file from the SD card; then use the *exec* command to launch U-Boot.

Below is an example of how you can load the *u-boot* file.

**NOTE:** If you see the *Please enter your LCD display number* message, enter the number of the display connected to your development kit (this will most likely be 15 which corresponds to the 4.3" WQVGA LCD included with your development kit).

- 4. When you see the *Hit any key to stop auto-boot* message and a countdown, press any key to stop the auto-boot process.
- 5. Scroll up in the terminal window and locate the message *NAND*: XX ECC *selected* (where *XX* is either *HW* or *Internal to NAND*), see highlighted line below for an example.

6. If *HW* appears, then 1-bit ECC is being used; if *Internal to NAND* appears, then 4-bit ECC is being used (the example above has memory that uses 1-bit ECC). This information will be necessary for steps in Section 3.3.

#### 3.3 Load Boot Files to NAND

In the instructions that follow, all commands following the terminal prompt => should be typed exactly as shown followed by then pressing the **Enter** key. Any deviation from this process will be called out in the **IMPORTANT NOTE** for that step.

1. Initialize the SD card.

```
=> mmc init
mmc1 is available
```

2. Verify the contents of the SD card.

```
=> fatls mmc 0
    xxxxxx    rootfs.yaffs2
    xxxxxx    u-boot.bin
    xxxxxxx    uImage
    xxxxx    x-load.bin.ift

4 file(s), 0 dir(s)
```

3. In order to load X-Loader to the OMAP35x SOM, the entire NAND chip must be erased.

```
=> nand erase

NAND erase: device 0 while chip
Erasing at 0xxxxxxx -- 100% complete.
OK
```

4. Load and burn X-Loader into NAND starting at offset 0x00000, as well as three duplicate locations in case of bad blocks, by entering the commands below.

```
=> fatload mmc 0 $loadaddr x-load.bin.ift
reading x-load.bin.ift

xxxxx bytes read
=> nandecc hw
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x00000 0x20000
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x20000 0x20000
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x40000 0x20000
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x40000 0x20000
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x60000 0x20000
```

5. Load and burn U-Boot into NAND starting at offset 0x80000.

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** If your memory chip uses 1-bit ECC, replace *<ECC1>* in the command below with *sw*; if your memory chip uses 4-bit ECC, replace *<ECC1>* with *chip*. (See Section 3.2 to determine which memory chip you have.)

```
=> fatload mmc 0 $loadaddr u-boot.bin
reading u-boot.bin

xxxxxx bytes read
=> nandecc <ECC1>
=> nand write $loadaddr 0x80000 0x40000
```

6. Load and burn the Linux kernel into NAND starting at 0x100000 (assuming the kernel is 0x280000 bytes or smaller).

**IMPORTANT NOTE:** If your memory chip uses 1-bit ECC, replace  $\langle ECC2 \rangle$  in the command below with hw; if your memory chip uses 4-bit ECC, replace  $\langle ECC2 \rangle$  with chip.

```
=> fatload mmc 0 $loadaddr uImage

=> nandecc <ECC2>

=> setenv kernelsize 0x280000

=> nand write $loadaddr 0x100000 $kernelsize
```

7. Load and burn the YAFFS2 root filesystem into NAND starting at offset 0xec0000.

```
=> fatload mmc 0 $loadaddr rootfs.yaffs2
reading rootfs.yaffs2

xxxxxxxx bytes read
=> nand write.yaffs $loadaddr 0xec00000 $filesize

NAND write: device 0 offset 0xec0000, size 0xxxxxxx

Writing data at 0xxxxxxxx -- 100% complete.
xxxxxxxx bytes written: OK
```

#### 3.4 Boot the Linux Kernel using X-Loader

- Reboot the development kit by pressing the POWER ON/OFF button on the baseboard.
  - Note that since we erased the entire NAND flash, all content was lost on this memory. This includes the U-Boot environment, so U-Boot will use the default environment.
- 2. You will see the *Please enter your LCD display number* message. Enter the number of the display connected to your development kit (this will most likely be **15** which corresponds to the 4.3" WQVGA LCD included with your development kit).
- 3. Interrupt the auto-boot sequence while it is counting down by pressing any key.
- 4. Set up the NAND boot method and variables; then save these variables to the U-Boot environment.

```
=> setenv kernelsize 0x280000
=> setenv nandboot 'nand read $loadaddr 0x100000 $kernelsize; run
mtdboot'
=> setenv bootcmd run nandboot
=> saveenv
```

5. Reboot the development kit by pressing the **POWER ON/OFF** button on the baseboard. Allow the auto-boot to continue and your development kit should boot into the Linux kernel. A portion of your terminal output will look similar to what you see below.

```

6. X-Loader and the Linux kernel have successfully been loaded onto your OMAP35x SOM. You can now use X-Loader to boot your OMAP35x Development Kit.
